Connection is a foundation of our nonprofit promise and all ECS communities provide daily social opportunities for discovery, learning, and fellowship. At ECS, "staying connected" means sharing our stories, enjoying new experiences together, and being there for each other – in good times and when facing challenges. Creating tailored housing and engaging programs for seniors is a cornerstone of the ECS mission and is integral to helping older adults stay connected – with friends, neighbors, and the greater community. This past quarter has seen many positive developments:

- The ECS and MonteCedro Boards authorized the merger of MonteCedro into ECS – effective June 30, 2023.
- MonteCedro is in the early stages of preview for 40 additional luxury apartment homes, including an additional restaurant, amphitheater and outdoor venues. Deposits have been secured on more than half the new homes, and groundbreaking will take place in Spring.
- Because of ECS's consulting services, St. Joseph's Church in Buena Park received funding for the construction of an affordable housing community.

As ECS embarks on the next century, our focus will continue to remain on the people we serve – residents, their families, and the greater community – and our connection to them.

A Neighborhood Icon Generations of Community

Twelve Oaks, set on five gorgeous park-like acres, has been a part of the Glendale community for more than 80 years.

Known originally as the Twelve
Oaks Lodge, the community
began when James and Effie
Fifield donated their 13-room
home to the Verdugo Hills
Sunshine Society for the
purpose of providing exceptional
accommodations for the elderly.

Over time, a charity was created. With funds donated by the City of Glendale, a new residence hall was built. Later saw the construction of additional apartments. Throughout the decades, Twelve Oaks has hosted many events and fundraisers



and played an active role in the greater Glendale community.

That connection to the community has continued in this century under the stewardship of Executive Director Denise Gotto. She says its success and longevity is due in part to the strong neighborhood ties. "When people move here, they still feel connected to the wider community. It feels like home."


Stories Around the Table *How Food Connects Us*
